### **Land Acknowledgement**

IMN-Ontario is housed at Western University and our network extends across the Province and beyond. We acknowledge the many territories and diverse Indigenous communities of our mentors, trainees and network participants across Ontario and Turtle Island (North America).



Western University is situated on the traditional territories of the Anishinaabeg, Haudenosaunee, Lunaapeewak and Attawandaron peoples, who have longstanding relationships to the land and region of southwestern Ontario and the City of London. The local First Nation communities of this area include Chippewas of the Thames First Nation, Oneida Nation of the Thames, and Munsee Delaware Nation. In the region, there are eleven First Nation communities

and a growing urban Indigenous population.

IMN-Ontario values the significant historical and contemporary contributions of local and regional First Nations and all of the Original peoples of Turtle Island.

# Message from Dr. Chantelle Richmond, **Nominated Principal Investigator**

"Our inaugural year was a profound success in bringing together our mentors, trainees and community partners to grow the next generation of Indigenous health scholars. This report is a celebration of that coming together, of the many people who make up our Network, and strengthening research relationships that value Indigenous knowledges and prioritize working directly with Indigenous communities

We are guided by three long-term goals. The first is to redress the structural inequalities experienced by Indigenous people in Ontario universities, seeing more Indigenous people in the university context at all levels, and primarily at the faculty level. The second goal is to increase the number of Indigenous people doing Indigenous health research, and our third goal is to support meaningful ways for Indigenous communities to participate and lead research on the issues that matter most to them.

This Network is about making deliberate spaces for Indigenous scholarship to be realized and to strengthen the relationships between Indigenous peoples, scholars, and our institutions. The way forward is for universities and funders to make their environments and programs more inclusive of Indigenous scholars, including their Indigenous knowledges and ways of doing research. And perhaps the most important part of our Network is that it has been built on a foundation of shared history, deep relational accountability, and a commitment to our families, communities, and the generations of Indigenous children yet to come."

# **Introducing IMN-Ontario**

The Indigenous Mentorship Network of Ontario (IMN-Ontario) provides First Nations, Inuit and Métis scholars and trainees with high quality mentorship, training, and opportunities to engage in Indigenous health and wellbeing research. We are funded as part of a five-year, Canada-wide Indigenous Mentorship Network Program through the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR)'s Institute of Indigenous Health Research.

IMN-Ontario is fundamentally rooted in the philosophy of 'community first', bringing together 100+ scholars, trainees and community partners of diverse skills, experiences and methodologies in Indigenous health research. We are an interdisciplinary collaboration supported by 13 partnering research institutions, including the leading Indigenous health scholars and research centres in Ontario. Our partnering institutions support the Network in different ways, including hosting scholarships at their universities, facilitating or hosting mentorship or learning opportunities, and helping to fund IMN-Ontario activities.

### Mno Nimkodadding Geegi: Supporting and growing the next generation of Indigenous health scholars

IMN-Ontario's driving force is inspired by the Anishinaabe concept, Mno Nimkodadding Geegi ('we are all connected'), encompassing the inter-relationships among youth and elders, health and environment, cultural practices, institutional policies, and many more. We seek to create and sustain the very best training

environments and mentorship opportunities for current and up and coming Indigenous scholars at the undergraduate, master's, doctoral and postdoctoral levels, with particular emphasis on community-based research.

We focus on four primary activity areas, holding Mno Nimkodadding Geegi and our community of students, scholars, and partners held at the centre of our work. Within these four areas, some of our offerings include:

- · Quarterly webinars to share knowledge, advice, and best practices
- · Annual scholarships and seed grants for Indigenous trainees
- · Annual community-based summer school
- Engagement in local, national and international networks
- Research innovation and publishing opportunities
- · Cultural, social and academic tools and resources



















# Official Launch Celebrates "Health Research by Indigenous People for Indigenous People"

We marked the official launch of IMN-Ontario on January 11, 2018 at Western University. Coming together with partners, students and community members, we emphasized the significance of Indigenous health training environments and programs that support research by Indigenous people for Indigenous people, and address the health and social issues that matter to Indigenous people.

"Despite an increase in research on Indigenous topics in Canada, inequities are growing and outcomes are not improving. The only way to change that is to work with communities, through diverse, interdisciplinary teams of trainees who know community landscapes intimately. For the first time, we are connecting the networks of the community with the networks of academia, and putting communities in the driver's seat on health research that matters to them." - Dr. Chantelle Richmond

# Webinar: Working in Relationship with Indigenous Communities

IMN-Ontario released our first webinar, Working in Relationship with Indigenous Communities, in Spring 2018. In a discussion format, a group of Indigenous and non-Indigenous allied scholars, mentored graduate students, Elder-in-Residence, and community partners met in circle at Nipissing University to share knowledge, advice and best practices for what it means to work with Indigenous communities in a good way. They shared that research with Indigenous communities is fundamentally based in relationships, as well as the challenges that can arise when these relationships are situated within the broader context of academia.

# **Undergraduate Workshop: Supporting Transitions to Health Research and Professions**

In February, IMN-Ontario hosted the Indigenous undergraduate workshop, Supporting Transitions to Health Research and Professions at Western University. This three-day workshop aimed to provide Indigenous undergraduate students with skills and mentorship to support successful transitions into graduate school and Indigenous health training. Facilitated by a panel of Indigenous health scholars and professionals, topics included:

- · Pathways to Indigenous health careers
- How to apply to grad school
- · Lessons from current graduate students
- Applied research in the Indigenous health context

# 2018 Summer Institute at **Laurentian University**

IMN-Ontario held our first Summer Institute at Laurentian University in June 2018. The four-day event hosted over 20 graduate students working in the field of Indigenous health research. Throughout the week, students gathered in Laurentian University's Indigenous Sharing and Learning Centre's Round Room, and out on the Land, to share their experiences and learn about a variety of topics related to Indigenous health and community-based research including: the challenges and opportunities experienced by Indigenous Peoples in academia, how to work collaboratively with communities, and how to find supportive mentors to help foster students' research journeys.
