Land Acknowledgment



IMN-Ontario is housed at Western University and our network extends across the Province and beyond. We acknowledge the many territories and diverse Indigenous communities of our mentors, trainees and network participants across Ontario and Turtle Island (North America).

Western University is situated on the traditional territories of the Anishinaabeg, Haudenosaunee, Lunaapeewak and Attawandaron peoples, who have longstanding relationships to the land and region of southwestern Ontario and the City of London. The local First Nation communities of this area include Chippewas of the Thames First Nation, Oneida Nation of the Thames, and Munsee Delaware Nation. In the region, there are eleven First Nation communities and a growing urban Indigenous population.

IMN-Ontario values the significant historical and contemporary contributions of local and regional First Nations and all of the Original peoples of Turtle Island.



IMN-Ontario Staff and Mentors


Our small team housed at Western includes two other staff. Veronica Reitmeier is an undergraduate student who works part-time as the Network's Research Assistant and manages our social media, and Katie Big-Canoe is our full-time Program Coordinator who oversees all Network activities. This year, PhD student, Vanessa Ambtman-Smith joined our team, who worked as Research Assistant for the National Gathering of Graduate Students.

We have also assembled a large group of dedicated Mentors from diverse areas of expertise, all of whom are passionate about Indigenous health research and training the next generation of Indigenous scholars. Spread across the province, they support our network in different ways, sometimes working directly with students, or supporting network activities by offering webinars, hosting events, or reviewing applications.

About IMN-Ontario

The Indigenous Mentorship Network of Ontario (IMN-Ontario) provides First Nations, Inuit and Métis scholars and trainees with high quality mentorship, training, and opportunities to engage in Indigenous health and wellbeing research. We are funded as part of a five-year, Canada-wide Indigenous Mentorship Network Program through the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR)'s Institute of Indigenous Health Research.

IMN-Ontario is fundamentally rooted in the philosophy of 'community first', bringing together 100+ scholars, trainees and community partners of diverse skills, experiences and methodologies in Indigenous health research. We are an interdisciplinary collaboration supported by 13 partnering research institutions, including the leading Indigenous health scholars and research centres in Ontario. Our partnering institutions support the Network in different ways, including hosting scholarships at their universities, facilitating or hosting mentorship or learning opportunities, and helping to fund IMN-Ontario activities.

Mno Nimkodadding Geegi: Supporting and growing the next generation of Indigenous health scholars

IMN-Ontario's driving force is inspired by the Anishinaabe concept, Mno Nimkodadding Geegi ('we are all connected'), encompassing the inter-relationships among youth and

elders, health and environment, cultural practices, institutional policies, and many more. We seek to create and sustain the very best training

environments and mentorship opportunities for current and up and coming Indigenous scholars at the undergraduate, Master's, doctoral and postdoctoral levels, with particular emphasis on community-based research.

We focus on four primary activity areas, holding Mno Nimkodadding Geegi and our community of students, scholars, and partners held at the centre of our work. Within these four areas, some of our offerings include:


- · Quarterly webinars to share knowledge, advice, and best practices

2019-2020 Webinar Highlights

Webinars provide opportunities for students and community members to learn more about IMN-Ontario and how to participate in our Network, as well as supports and information related to academic and professional development. It was also particularly important this year to provide a virtual space to gather and connect with cultural supports and teachings.











IMN Scholarship and NGGS Application Support

In January, Katie delivered two webinars, the first offering information and support related to IMN-Ontario scholarship and seed grant opportunities, and the second about applying for the National Gathering of Graduate Students (NGGS).

Indigenous Epidemiology

In February, Dr. Jennifer Walker (Laurentian University) discussed Indigenous epidemiology and the various graduate school opportunities available for Indigenous students.

Indigenous Teachings with Liz Akiwenzie

During the pandemic lock downs between April and the end of June, Traditional Knowledge Keeper Liz Akiwenzie Liz provided a virtual space to gather, learn and connect, delivering 5 bi-weekly webinars.

Academic CVs Webinar

In June, Dr. Karen Lawford, Dr. Diana Lewis, and Dr. Heather Castledon provided tips and guidance to help Indigenous health scholars build the curriculum vitae (CV) that makes them stand out above the rest! Participants were taught how to highlight their educational background, experience and key academic achievements, and how to tailor their CV for different purposes -- from applying for MA programs, to PhDs, and early career research opportunities.





2020 Scholarships and Seed Grants

Total funds awarded Year 3: \$97,500

In our third year, IMN-Ontario awarded 9 scholarships and one seed grant.

Scholarship Awardees

In 2020, we awarded five graduate and health professional scholarships to Indigenous students pursuing research in applied community-based Indigenous health and well-being.

We awarded four undergraduate scholarships to Indigenous students enrolled in an undergraduate program. These awards are intended to support Indigenous students who are pursuing academic studies with the future goal of utilizing their degree within an applied Indigenous health community context.

Dr. Lorrilee McGregor, Northern Ontario School of Medicine

Dr. Lorrilee McGregor is an Anishinaabe from Whitefish River First Nation on Manitoulin Island. She is an Assistant Professor at the Northern Ontario School of Medicine at Laurentian University in Sudbury where she teaches about Indigenous peoples' health. Dr. McGregor has focused her research on First Nation community health issues such as mental health and addictions, diabetes, physical activity, and nutrition. She has also worked with First Nation communities and organizations on program evaluation and strategic planning. For the past 18 years, Dr. McGregor has been an active member of the Manitoulin Anishinaabek Research Review Committee, a community research ethics committee, and has served as the Chair for most of that time.

2019 International Indigenous Mentorship Workshop, New Zealand

This workshop was co-hosted by the CIHR Institute of Indigenous Peoples' Health (IIPH), the Health Research Council (HRC) of New Zealand and the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) of Australia.

Emergency Financial Support


