Land Acknowledgment



IMN-Ontario is housed at Western University and our network extends across the Province and beyond. We acknowledge the many territories and diverse Indigenous communities of our mentors, trainees and network participants across Ontario and Turtle Island (North America).

Western University is situated on the traditional territories of the Anishinaabeg, Haudenosaunee, Lunaapeewak and Attawandaron peoples, who have longstanding relationships to the land and region of southwestern Ontario and the City of London. The local First Nation communities of this area include Chippewas of the Thames First Nation, Oneida Nation of the Thames, and Munsee Delaware Nation. In the region, there are eleven First Nation communities and a growing urban Indigenous population.

IMN-Ontario values the significant historical and contemporary contributions of local and regional First Nations and all of the Original peoples of Turtle Island.

Message from Dr. Chantelle Richmond, **Nominated Principal Investigator**

On behalf of IMN-Ontario, I hope you and your families are safe and healthy. As I write this, we have now lived through an entire year of a global pandemic. Our network activities have had to pivot in order to accommodate COVID-19 protocols, meaning we have not been able to gather in-person as a network. At the forefront of our activities has been the desire to seek ways in which we can better support our community throughout the COVID-19 pandemic. This report highlights the many ways we have fostered virtual connections.



As many of you may be aware, the Indigenous Mentorship Network Program across Canada will not be renewed beyond 2022. Canada Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) made the decision to invest its Indigenous health and research training funds in the Network Environments for Indigenous Health Research (NEIHR's), a national network of centres focused on capacity development, research and knowledge translation. Ontario's successful NEIHR is led by Professor Suzanne Stewart (University of Toronto), for her application "<u>Developing a Community-Engaged Research Network for</u> Indigenous Mental Health: Priorities, Knowledge Gaps and Engagement Strategies for Future Research"

Despite the fact that CIHR will not fund our Network beyond 2022, I am pleased to let you know that Ontario's NEIHR has committed to investing \$100k/year for 2020 to 2024. These funds will allow IMN-Ontario to continue its work for at least two years beyond our end date. Through a collaborative effort and widened community of partners, scholars, and trainees bridging the IMN and NEIHR in Ontario, it is our shared desire that the impact on Indigenous health trainees will continue to flourish.

IMN-Ontario has accomplished a good deal in the past three years. I attribute our success to the strength of our relational ethics, including our commitment to our communities and to one another. I would like to acknowledge our students for all your contributions in making the strong, beautiful and impactful Network we that we are. Thank you all for your compassion and persistence, for the important research you are working on, and for demanding more of your leaders and mentors. This is heart work! We could not do this work without you and we are grateful every day for your good energy.


IMN-Ontario Staff and Mentors

We have also assembled a large group of Mentors who are passionate about Indigenous health research and training the next generation of Indigenous scholars. Spread across the province, our Mentors support our Network in a variety of ways.

About IMN-Ontario

The Indigenous Mentorship Network of Ontario (IMN-Ontario) provides First Nations, Inuit and Métis scholars and trainees with high quality mentorship, training, and opportunities to engage in Indigenous health and wellbeing research. We are funded as part of a five-year, Canada-wide Indigenous Mentorship Network Program through the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR)'s Institute of Indigenous Health Research.

IMN-Ontario is fundamentally rooted in the philosophy of 'community first', bringing together 100+ scholars, trainees and community partners of diverse skills, experiences and methodologies in Indigenous health research. We are an interdisciplinary collaboration supported by 13 partnering research institutions, including the leading Indigenous health scholars and research centres in Ontario. Our partnering institutions support the Network in different ways, including hosting scholarships at their universities, facilitating or hosting mentorship or learning opportunities, and helping to fund IMN-Ontario activities.

Mno Nimkodadding Geegi: Supporting and growing the next generation of Indigenous health scholars

IMN-Ontario's driving force is inspired by the Anishinaabe concept, Mno Nimkodadding Geegi ('we are all connected'), encompassing the inter-relationships among youth and elders, health and environment, cultural practices, institutional policies, and many more. We seek to create and sustain the very best training

environments and mentorship opportunities for current and up and coming Indigenous scholars at the undergraduate, Master's, doctoral and postdoctoral levels, with particular emphasis on community-based research.

We focus on four primary activity areas, holding Mno Nimkodadding Geegi and our community of students, scholars, and partners held at the centre of our work. Within these four areas, some of our offerings include:

- · Quarterly webinars to share knowledge, advice, and best practices
- · Annual scholarships and seed grants for Indigenous trainees
- · Annual community-based summer institute
- Engagement in local, national and international networks
- Research innovation and publishing opportunities
- · Cultural, social and academic tools and resources
















2020-2021 Webinar Series

In August and September, we sought input from our students about their needs and what they would like to see offered through the Network, both through a survey and an open discussion webinar. IMN-Ontario organized our webinar series based on the feedback we received from students, including the need to learn about funding opportunities, academic workshops (e.g. writing for conferences – especially with so many offered virtually now and preparing for careers in academia), and continued virtual teachings with Traditional Knowledge Keeper Liz Akiwenzie.

In October, the IMN-Ontario Web Series began with an opportunity to learn how to apply for scholarships.

Abstract Writing for Conferences

Our wonderful Elder Liz Akiwenzie provided a virtual space to gather in December and learn about traditional Winter Solstice teachings.

Applying and Preparing for Scholarships

The team delivered two webinars in January to support students in applying for scholarship funding. The first provided information about IMN-Ontario scholarships and seed grants, including eligibility and the application process, and the second webinar focused on preparing 2021 doctoral scholarship applications.

Preparing for a Career in Academia

In March, IMN-Ontario Mentor Dr. Chelsea Gabel from McMaster University delivered a webinar for students close to finishing their PhD or interested in learning how to become a professor. 







Indigenous Graduate Student Recruitment Fair

National Gathering of Graduate Students

The National Gathering of Graduate Students (NGGS) is an annual gathering that brings together Indigenous graduate students doing research on Indigenous health and well-being. It is meant to foster belonging and support for Indigenous graduate students and provide a place for skill and capacity building and knowledge transfer. By learning with and from other graduate students, Indigenous faculty, and allied scholars from across the country, the NGGS is a culturally relevant and scientifically rigorous meeting.

2020 NGGS August 12 - 14

Following the cancellation of the in-person 2020 NGGS at Western, the regional Indigenous Mentorship Network Program Coordinators co-organized an **Online Gathering** for students and mentors to connect virtually, share research, and learn from academics through workshops. Over the span of three days, we heard from 27 student presenters (9 IMN-Ontario students), read 6 **research posters** (4 IMN-Ontario students) and participated in 10 Indigenous mentor workshops.

2021 NGGS June 7 - 29

Amidst the ongoing pandemic, the Indigenous Mentorship Network Program Coordinators from across Canada planned another virtual NGGS in 2021, with events taking place throughout June. Recognizing the pandemic has been difficult for our students, the theme was "Nurturing our Whole Selves" and events focused on self-care and relationship building.
